Sabyasachi Sengupta wins the world's largest speech contest

The event is considered the world's largest and most prestigious speech contest for amateur speakers, with past winners going on to become acclaimed authors, coaches, and keynote speakers. Winning the title is seen as a milestone achievement that brings international recognition and opportunities to inspire audiences worldwide.
